Recommend Materials: Electronic Keyboard or Piano. The keyboard does not have to be a full 88 key piano, but the key size must be full size. Practice rooms are available.

Required Texts: "The Joy of First Year Piano" by Denes Agay. Please note that we will discuss where to find other online public domain material. Additional PDFs created by the instructor will also be made available to students.

Students will be dropped from the class if they have not completed the assignment by the due date. The last day to re-add is Jan. 21st, 2024. You must attend the first class.

Student Learned Outcome (SLO): The successful student will demonstrate the basic knowledge of music notation enabling them to find pitches to be played on the keyboard and for the amount of time suggested by standard proportional durations. The successful student will be able to play major and minor scales up to four sharps and flats with a high degree of accuracy.

Class Participation: Students are <u>strongly</u> encouraged to participate in class discussions, performing and other activities that will take place during the regularly occurring class time. Classroom activities will include performing for your colleagues, assessment of colleague performances as well as ensemble practice.

Practice: Students are expected to practice an average of at least 30 minutes each day (3+ hours per week). On campus <u>practice rooms will be available</u> but it is strongly suggested that students have outside access to an acoustic or electronic keyboard with full-size keys but not necessarily a keyboard with all 88 keys.

Homework/Assignments: Written and performance homework will be assigned weekly and will make up a major portion of your final grade in the class. The homework topic and assignments will be reviewed during class. We will spend time during class reviewing each assignment and practicing these assignments together. Be sure to observe the due dates for each assignment as well as assignment details. All late assignments may receive no more than half credit. Late assignments will not be accepted more than two weeks after the due date. Assignments are generally worth 5 points each.

Canvas will include the weekly assignments, as well as important PDFs and assignment details. Your instructor will make available all the important PDFs to you through Canvas. When using Canvas, it is the student's responsibility to review and read carefully the material made available in the modules **if submitted online**. Please always check due dates for assignments as well as assignment details. Assignments may be submitted by uploading the assigned material through the Canvas platform but, this is not required. Check your grade for every assignment and read the comments from your instructor. You may have missed something when you submitted your assignment.

Rubric for performance assignments:

Piano Performances: Accurate notes (50%) and Accurate rhythm/continuity (50%). The rhythm must also include good continuity. Good continuity means playing with a steady tempo without hesitation or pauses.

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Midterm and Final (10 points each): Students will have one midterm performance and one final performance. The format for the midterm and final will be a performance for your colleagues in the virtual classroom. The specific work will be assigned by the instructor. The work performed for either the midterm or final does not need to be memorized.

Rubric for Midterm and Final Performance:

Rhythm/Continuity of performance: 50% (Be sure to pick a comfortable tempo.) Accuracy of notes: 50%. Other aspects of the performances such as articulation, dynamic variation and other nuances will be taken into consideration when assessing more advanced student performances.

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Drop Policy: Dropping a course is the responsibility of the student. Students are enrolled in the course until they have followed the drop procedure. The instructor will not drop a student after the first day of instruction. The only exceptions to this are hospitalization (This requires a note from a doctor on letter head with contact information), death or incarceration all of which will need proof by documentation. Forgetting to drop the class is not a serious situation that qualifies for a late drop. If a student no longer attends class from the "W" drop date, an FW (Failure to withdraw) will be recorded. Late drops require a signature from the dean with written documentation of the serious circumstance. The most important thing to do if a situation does arise is to communicate with your instructor immediately.

Extra credit: Extra credit assignments will be offered during the quarter. Extra credit assignments should not be used in lieu of general homework assignments. Extra credit assignments are generally worth the same as the other weekly assignments (5 points).

Receiving an "INC": In the event of an emergency, whereby a student misses the final, the last assignment or something of that nature, students can receive an incomplete so that the missing work may be made-up within a time frame discussed between the instructor and the student. An incomplete will not be granted because of poor classroom performance or missed classroom participation. Additionally, the missing work must be completed by the following quarter of the academic year and must include some written documentation for the change of grade from the recorded incomplete. Forgetting the time or date of the final does not qualify as an emergency. You will not be granted an "INC" if you forget to show for the final. To receive an incomplete, you must have already completed at least 75% of the class work.

Grading:

All grading is based on homework, performance quizzes as well as the midterm and final performances. The midterm and final are performances for the class and not just the instructor.

INC: To receive an INC the student must have completed 75% of the work and have documentation proving the serious circumstance.

FW: A failure to withdraw grade will be recorded instead of an F if a student no longer attends a class after the last day to drop with a "W" recorded.

EW: Excused Withdrawal can also be requested by the student. This is outlined by the school at https://www.deanza.edu/admissions/withdrawals.html.

Assignments: Please verify the due dates for every assignment. If you prefer to upload your assignment, double check the due dates online. Uploaded assignments are generally due two days after the in-class due date. We will review every assignment (written or performance) during class. All assignments are generally worth 5 points or a fraction of depending on your performance. The general rubrics (grading criteria) will be discussed during class and are posted online. All late assignments may receive no more than half credit. Late assignments will not be accepted more than two weeks after the due date. No work will be accepted after the final.

- <u>Calendar:</u> Assignments are generally due each Thursday with an option to upload to Canvas by the following Sunday. Please refer to Canvas if you have missed a class or need to upload an assignment for a class you have missed. <u>If you plan to skip any classes, plan ahead of time and complete assignments early.</u> We will generally do a review of the assignments due that day on the due date. It is the responsibility of the student to review the assignments before the due date.
- <u>Weeks 1 and 2:</u> Pitch notation assignments #1 and #2, Clapping assignments #1 and #2. Piano Performance, page 12 from "Joy of First Year Piano". <u>In-person performance due Jan. 18th (online upload due Jan. 21st).</u> <u>Submitting assignments earlier would be a good idea.</u>
- <u>Week 3:</u> Piano performance, page 15 from "Joy of First Year Piano". Pitch notation assignments #3, Clapping assignments #3. <u>In-person performance due Jan. 25th (online upload due Jan. 28th).</u> Throughout the quarter, we will continue to review scales each week.
- <u>Week 4:</u> Piano performance, page 16 **or** page 13 from "Joy of First Year Piano". Pitch notation assignment #4. <u>In-person performance due Feb. 1st (online upload due Feb. 4th).</u>
- <u>Weeks 5:</u> Practice midterm performance <u>for instructor only</u> on Feb. 8th. This will be a rough draft performance on an acoustic piano similar to the kind of instrument will be performing on during the midterm. While still perhaps a work in progress, you should be able to perform through your midterm piece. This is not for a grade. Extra credit assignments may be performed on this day as well.
- <u>Week 6:</u> <u>Midterm performance Feb. 15th</u>. Pick one of the following pages 17, 18, 19, 20, or 21 from "Joy of First Year Piano". <u>In-person performance only.</u> C major Scale Performance. All scales are performed two octaves (ascending and descending) and performed hands separately. <u>In-person performance due Feb. 15th</u> (online upload due Feb. 18th).
- <u>Week 7:</u> Pitch notation assignment #5. Page 25 from "Joy of First Year Piano". <u>In-person performance due Feb. 22nd (online upload due Feb. 25th).</u>
- <u>Week 8:</u> Page 29 from "Joy of First Year Piano". Scale performance: Pick two of the following scales, a different scale for each hand: G, D, A, or E major scale. All scales are performed two octaves (ascending and descending) and performed hands separately. <u>In-person performance due Feb. 29th (online upload due March 3rd).</u>
- Week 9: Lecture only and open lab. March 7th. We will spend class time reviewing the flat scales.
- <u>Week 10:</u> Scales Performance: Pick one of the following scales: F, Bb, Ab, or Eb major scale. All scales are performed two octaves (ascending and descending) and performed hands separately. <u>In-person performance</u> due March 14th (online upload due March 17th).
- <u>Week 11:</u> Practice final performance for instructor only on March 21st. This will be a rough draft performance on an acoustic piano similar to the kind of instrument will be performing on during the midterm. While still perhaps a work in progress, you should be able to perform through your midterm piece. This is not for a grade. Extra credit assignments may be performed on this day as well.
- Week 12: Final Performance (Thursday, March 28th) Students will pick one piece from the following for the final performance: Pages 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 42, 43, or 45 from "Joy of First Year Piano". In-Person performance only.
