SYLLABUS

Scope: This course is designed to expose you to a wide range of artistic and art historical knowledge. After an introductory chronological survey of pre-historic through modern art, the course will take a thematic approach and will concentrate on the methods artists use to achieve their stylistic effects, as well as an analysis of the role art plays in cultures and societies. As a Learning in Communities class linked with EWRT 2, we will explore art through the themes of Stolen Moments with Art. Two of your assignments (Essay #1 and the Research Paper) are integrated with EWRT 2.

Arts 1A Student Learning Outcomes: Students will analyze the social experiences of artists, demonstrating how artists' relationships with their patrons was a defining factor in the production of works of art. Students will demonstrate visual literacy and critical thinking skills by evaluating diverse scholarly perspectives when interpreting works of art. Students will investigate the different techniques utilized in the production of works of art through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of art objects in local collections.

Reading: The text is strongly recommended, but not required.

Exams: There will be one short quiz every week, for a total of 11 quizzes. Each quiz will be multiple choice. In addition, there will be one midterm exam that will consist of free response questions. No makeup exams will be given except in cases of

emergencies.

<u>Papers:</u> There will be two paper assignments, one of which will require a virtual or in-person trip to a museum, and will consist of an analysis of one or two pieces of art. Both assignments count towards your EWRT 2 class as well. Further details will be discussed in class.
