Catalog Description

Introduction to the language and cultures of Spanish-speaking world areas. Speaking, listening, reading and writing language skills at the first level of elementary Spanish are developed within the framework of language as a fundamental expression of culture. Spanish is the primary language of instruction. Language laboratory practice and/or assignments, at home and/or in the language lab, are an integral part of instruction supporting the development of language skills in the areas of pronunciation, structure, syntax, and oral communication.

English Writing 211 and Reading 211 (or Language Arts 211), or ESL 272-273.

Objectives (goals) to be accomplished in this class

Learn the basics of the Spanish language primarily <u>in Spanish</u>. Learn about cultural and linguistic diversity in the Spanish-speaking world.

Tune your ear to natural Spanish as spoken by native speakers.

Develop writing skills (at the paragraph-level) in Spanish.

Perform orally in Spanish to meet basic communication needs.

Read simple texts in Spanish (e.g., recognize cognates, get the main idea and some detail)

Budget 13.75 hours per week to attend class, prep, do homework, and study.

You will be able to:

- ➤ Understand the gist and recognize basic details of simple, aural / written texts adapted for learners on familiar topics. (Student Learning Outcome "SLO" #1)
- ➤ Perform with some hesitation a variety of communicative tasks dealing with basic routines and day-to-day social situations in the present. Produce simple phrases or sentences related to personal experiences. Both orally and in writing basic errors may impede comprehensibility. (Student Learning Outcome #2)
- ➤ Engage critically with constructions of cultural and social differences while examining their own cultural positionings and assumptions as expressed through language. (Student Learning Outcome #3)

Watch Out for Seemingly Cheaper Textbook Deals Elsewhere

- Whether you're looking on your own for a NEW, USED or RENTAL book, make sure it's a 3rd ed (2022) that includes a new *Connect* code.
- □ Normally, online sites elsewhere sell /rent only the book (in paper copy) without access to *Connect*. That's why they can sell it or rent it so cheaply.
- Once you buy or rent a cheap copy of the book with no *Connect* access, you end up paying a lot more just to get the access. Why? Because there is NO cheap, "stand-alone" version of *Connect* that you can purchase to make your own bundle (to add to a cheap paper copy of the book).



Be ready to respond orally and/or in writing and to engage/interact with classmates when prompted. Volunteer answers/comments/questions. Make a noticeable effort to integrate into and contribute to class activities.

2. Homework (50%):

Connect grades automatically appear on the Canvas grade book. Scores are automatically calculated, based on completion and performance. You're allowed to complete any exercise as many times as you'd like to improve your score. **Connect** automatically saves and records your best attempt in such cases.

- □ 15% Canvas assignments (group discussions / surveys / quizzes) to foster your engagement in the class and to monitor your progress/status in the class.
- 3. Progress in Oral Expression 15% Measured in class (see (1) above), periodically through assignments, and cumulatively at the end of the quarter through a recorded, video conversation with a class partner. Portions of class will focus on development of oral and listening skills/strategies. Goals: comprehensibility and accuracy (in pronunciation and use of vocabulary/grammar).
- 4. Chapter Tests (Pruebas) on Canvas (outside of class hours) with a 18-24 hour window to submit. (Four, detailed chapter tests for Conéctate capítulos 1, 2, 3, 4): 10%. Lowest grade dropped. See chapter calendar on Canvas for dates
- 5. *Final exam on Canvas (grammar of capítulos 1-5, plus capítulo 5 vocabulary)*: **10**% Required to pass the course. Wednesday, March 26th @ 7:00AM-10:30AM

Course Policies

#1 Absences

- > Up to 4 absences (over the entire duration of the quarter) is considered reasonable.
- ➤ I recommend you send me a short email whenever you're absent, especially in the case of recurring absences due to a lingering issue (e.g., work schedule, illness, caregiving duties).
- ➤ If you miss a class (or portion of a class) due to Internet or connectivity issues, please let me know as soon as possible, so that I can make a note and excuse the time you missed.

#2 Exams

- No Make Up Exams: Since the lowest chapter exam grade is dropped, missing an exam won't affect your grade.
- > Special Testing Accommodations (e.g., extra time). Available only for students who are registered through Disability Support Services and who have a Letter of Accommodation.
- Final Exam: Required to pass the class. Make up available only within final examinations week. Please discuss with me the option of filing for an "Incomplete" if unforeseen circumstances keep

you from taking the final during that week. "No shows" who do not contact the instructor within finals week will receive an **F** as their final class grade.

#3 Handling Problematic Deadlines

- If you know ahead of time of issues/events that will interfere with your submission of a specific assignment, you may request an extension, but you must contact me before the assignment becomes overdue. Examples of such issues/events may include multiple academic deadlines falling on the same day (e.g., exams, presentations, college applications /orientations/ interviews), legally mandated appearances, appointments for medical procedures/treatments, job-related duties such as travel/training/interviews).
- ➢ If you experience unforeseen conflicts that will interfere with your submission of a specific assignment, you may request an extension, ideally before the due date. Do communicate with me as soon as possible. Examples of such conflicts include car trouble, traffic accident, sudden illness or injury (your own or someone under your care), death in the family, emergency travel (e.g., funeral, job related), emotional or psychological crisis (e.g., panic attack, anxiety disorder, clinical depression).

Academic Integrity

In an online testing environment (Canvas, in this case), academic dishonesty may take an even wider range of shapes than in face-to-face testing. It may include someone taking an exam for you, or assisting you while you take an exam, or it may be *you* using the textbook/your notes/online sources while taking an exam. It may be someone composing, translating, and/or proof-reading an assignment for you. It may also be you and one or more classmates doing homework together and submitting the same exact answers, or it may be you using online tools (e.g., Google Translate, Chat GPT) to submit work that isn't a truthful representation of your language abilities. Campus policies will be followed. In this class, no credit will be given to academically dishonest work; neither will there be a chance for a make-up.

Study Tips

If your goal is to become fluent in Spanish, remember that fluency is not the automatic result of completing X number of courses... In adults, it is never a passive process that just "happens," even if one is surrounded by the language. *In reality, fluency is a lifelong process. It is up to you, though, to set the pace.*

Learning a language is like constructing a building or climbing a mountain. You can't get to the top without starting at the bottom and making steady (and sometimes slow) progress. Below are some recommendations.

During class

- (1) Stay on task.
- (2) Take neat notes.
- (3) Don't be afraid to ask questions or ask for clarification / repetition.

Before or After Class

- (1) Come to office hours.
- (2) Email me (include screenshots as applicable) if you need clarification about anything (e.g., tricky *Connect* exercises)
- (3) Review your notes from previous classes: read them out loud, check for gaps, expand, or rewrite.
- (4) Actively practice spelling and pronunciation, not just recognition of the written word.
- (5) Work on *Connect* exercises several times a week, rather than in one sitting on Sundays.
- (6) Practice using flash cards (e.g., your own or profe Carmen's *Quizlet* sets on Canvas)

Outside of class

- (1) Try reading, watching, or listening to materials with content that you're familiar with (e.g., sports, cars, fashion, music, news).
- (2) Discover fun materials designed for or conducive to self-study (*podcasts*, apps, songs, children's shows). These usually come with a lot of repetition and visual content that can reinforce your understanding.
