The first speech will be recorded and submitted as a Canvas assignment. See Module 1 for the instructions and assignment. The remaining four speeches will be presented on Zoom. There are two Zoom speech session choices during each of the four speech weeks: You will sign up separately for each speech. See the Zoom speech signup assignment in Week 1 Module and also in Week 2 Module when it will be due. Review your schedule carefully and sign up for all of your speech dates by Friday, January 10, 11:59pm. Both sessions have limited slots so sign up early to get your first choice. If later in the quarter you want to change any dates, contact me. Since that change may not be possible, make your initial choices carefully.

Course Description: Effective public speaking skills are essential for members of a democratic society. In this course, you will develop strategies for designing well-organized, researched, extemporaneous speeches on a variety of topics adapted to a diverse audience. The speeches and online discussions allow you to practice and critique your oral communication skills as well as observe and evaluate those of others. Readings, lectures, written assignments, and quizzes serve as resources for you as you develop your public speaking abilities and become more at ease when addressing an audience. Course Objectives (CLO's)

#### The student will:

- 1. Examine historical and cultural traditions of oral communication in both domestic and global contexts and assess their impact on our views, beliefs, and practices relating to speaking in public.
- 2. Evaluate how making the decision to respect diversity, speak ethically, and think critically influences communication outcomes.
- 3. Select, locate, evaluate, and use information technologies and information sources.
- 4. Apply research, analyze, organize, compose, present, and evaluate informative and persuasive speeches.
- 5. Develop confidence in delivering speeches extemporaneously in front of a live audience.
- 6. Develop listening skills to foster respectful, reflective, and critical listening appropriate in public presentation.
