English 1A (Composition and Reading) is a transfer-level course which teaches students to read and analyze college-level texts and to write college-level essays with the focus on critical thinking approaches. All coursework will be done online using a course management software, Canvas.

In this course we learn the techniques and practice of personal, analytical and argumentative writing based on our critical reading of texts. This course is designed to teach you to write an organized, well-developed expository essay with a minimum number of mechanical errors--in short, to write college-level prose. To this end, we will address the writing process (pre-writing, writing and revising) as well as questions of sentence structure and error identification.

The student learning objectives and outcomes for this course include the following: 1) Practicing writing as a multi-step process including planning and revising with attention to varying purposes, audiences, and rhetorical strategies; and; 2) Reading and analyzing rhetorically and culturally diverse narrative and expository texts from a variety of perspectives.

All of the required course materials will be provided for you. They are available on our Canvas course site.

Course Requirements:

This class will require approximately 8,000 words of graded writing: 4 essays and drafts, several short writing assignments, discussion assignments, and quizzes. All coursework will be submitted through the Canvas course site with each assignment is described in detail.

- Essays and Drafts: The graded essays counting for the bulk of your course grade will be formal writing assignments graded numerically according to a grading standard. The essays will be analytical responses to the required texts. Two of the four essays will involve peer editing, the first drafts reviewed and critiqued through assigned peer groups. The other two essays are written under timed constraints in one sitting. Note the mandatory participation dates for these two essays. Failure to submit essays in a timely manner will result in being dropped from the course. Instances of plagiarism will not be tolerated. You will fail the course and be reported to the Dean of Student Development for academic dishonesty if you plagiarize ideas or parts of a paper. Throughout the quarter we will work on integrating and citing outside sources in your essays. All essays will be submitted on our course site AND two of them on Turnitin.com. A similarity score of 25%+ will not be acceptable. Reliance on AI to generate and shape your writing will be penalized.
- Essay-building assignments--Observation Discussion post&response, Summary with a focus, Passage analysis, Naysayer, Writing Process Reflection: For every essay assignment there will be discussion forums set up to facilitate observation writing assignments consisting of posting responses to discussion questions and prompts and responding to a classmate's post. There will be due dates for the initial posts and responses to a post, and the discussion forums will remain open until the corresponding essay is due. Each essay unit consists of a series of assignments that produce content and parts of the essay. These essay-building assignments are open until the essay is due, but they must be completed in sequence and in a timely manner.

• Quizzes: There will be quizzes, which are designed to highlight key information and ensure that the texts are being read. Quizzes cannot be made up, and your lowest quiz score will be dropped from your final course grade.

**Note that in order to maintain active status in the course you must login within the first week of the term and submit all of your essay assignments by each of their ultimate deadlines. Failure to complete the writing assignments and to post and respond to the discussion forums may result in being dropped from the course and will ultimately affect your course grade. In order to proceed with the course and open the weekly modules you will need to complete the required tasks of the current week's module. TO HAVE A CHANCE OF PASSING THIS COURSE YOU MUST COMPLETE ALL ESSAY ASSIGNMENTS.

You will be expected to log in to your class web site on a regular basis to access course materials, complete and submit assignments, and participate in discussion forums. *Regular interaction with me* consists of my weekly updates published every Monday; my feedback for your coursework available within 48hrs of the due date; my feedback for your essays available10-14 days after the due date; and weekly synchronous zoom office hours. *Substantive interaction in the course* includes your submission of assignments and my feedback for them, your participation in multiple discussion forums for each essay and your participation in peer review for each essay, both of which involves your peers and my feedback for your work.

- Timed Essay 1 Unit (observations, summaries, passage analysis, essay written under timed constraints in one sitting on Tuesday 1/21, reflection)→20%
- Essay 2 Unit (observations, passage analysis, naysayer, draft, peer review, final draft, reflection)

- Timed Essay 3 Unit (observations, summary, passage analysis, naysayer, essay written under timed constrains in one sitting on Monday 2/24, reflection)→25%
- Essay 4 Unit (observations, passage analyses, naysayer draft, peer review, final draft, reflection)

 →27.5%
- Quizzes→2.5%

A Suggested Routine for doing the coursework:

- 1. Bookmark the log in page for the class web site. Log in on a regular basis. You should not go more than a day without logging in, for it is crucial to be engaged, not only participating in discussion forums and submitting your assignments, but also reading and receiving my feedback for your work. The software tracks your involvement and participation on the class web site, and will help me to identify those of you who need reminders for more engagement.
- 2. Read the Weekly Schedule for reading and writing assignments for that week. There will be reading and listening assignments for every week, so you can find the pages to read in your texts and you can access online materials. It should be the first page that you visit as part of your

- routine. Consult the syllabus and calendar for the relevant due dates for assignments. I will also include any further instruction in the form of written and/or video demonstrations and other lessons in addition to the Weekly Lessons. I will post a weekly announcement that describes the tasks for the week, my reflections on how you have been performing and handling the writing process thus far, emphasizing what you have been doing well and what you need to improve.
- 3. Next on your routine should be a visit to the current Discussion Forums. You will find directions and prompts for each week's discussion topics where you will post your observations and responses. Your posts and your responses to your classmate's posts will be organized in threaded discussions based on the assignment topic. The discussion assignments are opportunities for you to express your understandings of the texts that you read/listen to, and to engage your classmates and instructor in meaningful dialogue. More importantly, your discussion observation post initiates the writing process for the corresponding essay. In other words, you are starting to write your essay with your observation posts. If you have any questions about the assignments and your tasks, you can post them in the appropriate Q&A Forum. I will respond to your questions in the same thread as soon as possible, within 24hrs.
- 4. Check the announcements tab/page for weekly updates, reminders, and changes. If I were to modify an assignment or change it you will be notified through an announcement.
- 5. Check your messages! Whenever I post a grade and feedback for your work you will receive a notification/message letting you know about it. I also contact you via canvas message, reminding you to submit your work and encouraging you to meet with me during my zoom office hour.
- 6. If you have any questions, comments or concerns, the best way to address them is to meet with me during my weekly zoom office hours. No appointment is necessary. Just drop in!
