About ESL 251/451

In this class, you will improve your academic listening skills, pronunciation, conversation skills, and presentation skills. We will accomplish this by working independently and with your classmates using the class handouts, online lectures, podcasts, and interviews.

All requirements and policies for non-credit classes (**ESL 451**) are exactly the same as credit classes (**ESL 251**), including course content, assignments, grading and attendance. **Non-credit students are expected to come to every class, study, and do homework just like credit students.**

Class Activities

Weekly Listening Practice

Every week, you will be assigned a lecture video to listen to. You will watch the lecture multiple times and very carefully as part of your homework. Then, you will complete each of the following:

- **Vocabulary:** Match key vocabulary words with their definitions. Then, create example sentences using the vocabulary words.
- **Listening Questions:** Answer questions about the lecture video to check your understanding of the lecture.
- **Video Journal:** Record a video that includes a summary, opinion, and practice vocabulary sentences. You will also watch and respond to a few of your classmate's videos.

During class time, we will discuss the listening exercise of the week. Then, we will do pre-listening activities together to prepare for the next listening exercise.

Pronunciation

We will practice different pronunciation skills throughout the class. We will then apply those skills to individual words, phrases, and entire sentences. We will read a text at the beginning of the term to assess our current pronunciation skills and then revisit that same text at the end of the class.

Workshop Reports

While our time together in ESL 251/451 will be a valuable learning experience, the reality is that one quarter (11 weeks) is not enough time to grow our listening and speaking fluency and confidence.

Therefore, part of this class is learning how to take advantage of English resources at De Anza College. Every amount of practice will help you get closer to your language goals.

Listening & Speaking Center (LSC) Workshops: 50-minute small group sessions (8-12 students) for everyday conversation practice and on language-related topics.

You will write a brief report (summary & opinion) for each workshop or CCP meeting and submit it on Canvas.

You are required to attend <u>at least 4</u> workshops or CCP sessions during the quarter. If you choose the CCP option, the program requires a commitment of 5 meetings but you only need to write 4 reports for this class.

Two (2) Workshop Reports will be turned in the day of the midterm exam and an additional two (2) will be turned in at the end of the guarter.

At the end of the term, **a Canvas course grade will be lowered by 5%** for every **Grading Category** that does not meet the percentage criteria for a certain Learning Experience.

Example: A student earns the Silver Learning Experience - 86% on Canvas, 100% attendance, but only 60% on the Midterm Exam. 86% on Canvas will drop by 5% to 81% for a "B-" in the class.

Assignment Grades

Improving English takes time, effort, and **plenty of mistakes**. Mistakes are often seen as bad and even shameful. However, making mistakes is one of the best ways to learn - we can problem solve and find solutions for future success. In this class, we will make lots of mistakes!

Your assignments will be graded based on **thoughtful effort** and *not* on perfection. If you meet the criteria for each assignment, you will get full points.

All assignments will receive one of the following marks:

- Complete: The assignment meets all of the criteria. No further work is needed. (100%)
- Partial Credit: The assignment meets most of the criteria. (75%)
- Needs Attention: The assignment meets some of the criteria. (50%)
- X Incomplete: The assignment is missing or might be academically dishonest. (25%)

Late Work

Part of the criteria for each assignment is a deadline. Turning in work within one week of the original deadline will result in **Partial Credit** for the assignment.

For example, if an assignment is due at 11:59pm on a Sunday night, you have until the next Sunday at 11:59pm to turn in the assignment late for Partial Credit.

If you know that you will need extra time on an assignment, please talk to or email Katelyn before it is due (but not right before!!). I am more than happy to give reasonable extensions to those who ask for them. I cannot grant extensions once a deadline has passed.

Attendance Policy

Your attendance and active participation are important to your learning experience. **Please try to schedule your appointments outside of our class time!**

However, there may be days where you need to miss a class due to family duties, feeling unwell, stress, or unexpected events. **There are at least 2 free absences for each Learning Medal** so please take a break from class if needed.

If you miss class for any reason, you still need to complete the work you missed. I am happy to meet with you to talk about what we did in class or assignment details. Please let me know how I can help you learn and succeed!

Late Arrivals & Leaving Early

Please try your best to be on time and ready to learn when our class starts at 8:30am. I highly recommend arriving to the classroom or logging in to Zoom a few minutes early.

Arriving late or leaving early two times will count as one absence. Arriving more than 30 minutes late to class will count as an "absence."

Excused Absences

If any of our classes conflicts with one of your religious holidays or official De Anza College activities, **please let Katelyn know within the first 2 weeks of the quarter.**

Absences for other valid reasons such as illness, accidents, or injury might be excused. Please communicate with Katelyn as soon as possible - written documentation such as a doctor's note may be required.

FLEX Passes
